Registration – All parishioners should be properly registered in the parish. Please contact the parish office.

Sacrament of Marriage – Contact the parish office as soon as possible, before establishing a date for the wedding. The Diocese requires 12 months advance notice and preparation for Marriage.

Baptism, Sacrament of the Sick, Shut-ins – Please contact the parish office to register for Baptism. One sponsor (Godparent) should be a practicing Catholic (if married, married in the church; attending Mass every weekend; moral life; etc.). One sponsor may be a practicing Protestant (called a Christian witness). We strive to visit parishioners homebound and those in the hospital. Please call the parish office if you would like us to visit, or if you are preparing for surgery.

Mass Cards & Memorial contributions – Mass cards in memory of the deceased and for special intentions are available after masses at the Religious Articles Corner. To make a memorial contribution, please contact the parish office.

CCD – Religious instruction for children meets after the 9:15 Mass until 11:45 from September to May. These classes are necessary before children receive First Holy Communion and Confirmation. Please contact the parish office for more information or registration.

Parish Pastoral Council – Meets the 3rd Monday of each month, from September to May. Please call the parish office for information.

Knights of Columbus – Meets the 1st Wednesday of each month at 7:00 PM in the social hall.

Women's Guild – Meets the last Tuesday of each month at 6:30 PM in the social hall.

RCIA (Rite of Christian Initiation of Adults) – These are classes for those desiring to join the Catholic Church. Please contact the Pastor for more information.

A FRESH PERSPECTIVE ON THE SUNDAY READINGS
HIS WORD TODAY by Rev. William J. Reilly
Sixth Sunday of Easter
May 17, 2020

“Beloved: Sanctify Christ as Lord in your hearts. Always be ready to give an explanation to anyone who asks you for a reason for your hope, but do it with gentleness and reverence, keeping your conscience clear... For it is better to suffer for doing good, if that is the will of God, than for doing evil...for Christ suffered that he might lead you to God.”

How wonderful if you would take the time or make the opportunity to read the entire letter of Saint Peter. He spent his time, helping the first and persecuted Christians to remain strong in their faith. Are you ready to answer questions people might pose, because you are a believer? There are so many people hungry for the truth and for the Lord, and you might be the instrument He uses to bring them back, or even to meet Him for the first time.

The reason others approach you is because they find something special in you, they want what you have. If you are not sure how to respond, suggest a bible study or faith sharing group – and join one yourself. In this way all can grow together in faith as we walk the journey together. As someone told me today, they heard a voice saying ‘I am waiting for you.’

First Reading: Acts 8:5-8, 14-17

Philip preaches to the people of Samaria, who accept his word after witnessing the miracles he performs. Peter and John pray that they will receive the Holy Spirit.

Second Reading: 1 Peter 3:15-18

Christians are urged to remain steadfast in their allegiance to Christ, giving evidence always of gentleness and hope.

Gospel: John 14:15-21

In his words to the apostles at the Last Supper, Jesus promises to send them a comforter, a Paraclete, the Spirit of truth, who will be with them always.

Rosary After Mass



Starting May 1st, the rosary will be prayed out loud, after every live streamed Mass at Saint Jude Church. This is a perfect opportunity for reviving the old, traditional family rosary. Both individuals and families are welcome to pray out loud with us at home as we petition Jesus, through the intercession of His Blessed Mother, for Heavenly assistance and healing during this coronavirus crisis.

Mothers and Saints

Many of us looking back on our childhood and young adulthood are humble enough to admit "My mother is/was a saint." We probably did not accord our mothers the high honor at the time but now in retrospect they should be canonized for their limitless patience, unflagging perseverance and unconditional love. Since we just observed Mother's Day and since I have been on a roll

recently writing about two saints, I got to thinking about saints – ancient and recent - who were mothers. Probably the first to come to mind and the best known is St. Monica who by persevering prayer and many tears finally saw the conversion of her son, Saint Augustine. There is a tender passage in his great work, *The Confessions*, in which Monica tells her son that she knows she is dying. They were in Ostia, then the port city of Rome, waiting to sail to their native place in Africa. Her only request was that he remember her at "the altar of the Lord wherever you may be." No doubt he honored her request throughout his lifetime. Someone much less familiar is a woman who has the title "The Mother of Saints," Saint Emilia of Caesarea (d. 375). She was the mother of 10, six of whom are saints, including Saint Basil the Great and Saint Gregory of Nyssa. It didn't hurt that the husband and father of this family was Saint Basil the Elder. Now that's a holy family! The discovery that you are going to be a mother can at times cause distress and fear. Feelings of uncertainty and inadequacy are not uncommon. Take a look at Blessed Maria Quattrocchi (1884-1965). She and her husband, Blessed Luigi, had four children. She was terrified by the first pregnancy and was near despair by the second. In a letter to her husband Maria wrote: "Who will give me strength to think of two children? To endure the physical and psychological exhaustion of pregnancy and all the rest. Believe me, I am truly in despair." If you're a mom or a mother-to-be and you feel the need to scream to the top of your lungs over the stress of mothering, here is a holy lady who understands you and will pray for you. Some saint mothers knew the profound sadness of seeing their children die before they did. Saint Elizabeth Ann Seton (1774-1821), the first American born canonized saint, married William Seton and they had five children. When her father-in-law died, they took in her husband's six younger half-siblings. Widowed at age 29, Elizabeth had the care of 11 children, her own five children were all under 8 years of age. She converted from the Episcopal Church to Catholicism and founded the Sisters of Mercy of Saint Joseph's. By the time of her death at 47, she had seen her two sons and two of her daughters die. Only Catherine, the first American to enter the Sisters of Mercy, was alive at her mother's death. Saint Elizabeth Ann wrote: "Afflictions are the steps to heaven." She knew those steps well. Lately one of the names most frequently chosen by young women for their Confirmation is Gianna in honor of Saint Gianna Beretta Molla (1922-62). Saint Gianna is best remembered for her heroic sacrifice of choosing the life of her unborn daughter over her own. Additionally, she is a model for pregnant women experiencing a health crisis, for working mothers – she was a practicing physician – and for women who have lost children through miscarriage – she lost her fourth and fifth children to miscarriage. She remains a selfless witness to the sanctity of life. So there's a small sampling of some saint mothers whom the Church honors and who want us to be with them in our heavenly home. Each in her own way mirrored some of the virtues, some of the beauty, some of the graces of our Blessed Mother, Mary, to whose abundant love and protection we commend our own mothers. Be Firm in Your Christian Faith

At this time of pandemic, let us be firm in our Christian faith. Let us become more hopeful about our future, though we live a time of uncertainty. We have restrictions to travel freely, to visit our loved ones in the nursing homes and hospitals, to do our regular businesses, to go to church to attend Holy Mass, to let our children play outdoor etc. We never imagined that this would happen in our life and we never want it to happen again. We are not sure when normalcy will return. The people of Israel had many such experiences in their life. We have references from the prophet Samuel and the Psalmist. **"During the time young Samuel was minister to the Lord under Eli, the word of the Lord was scarce and vision infrequent."** (1 Sam 3:1) **"Even so we have seen no signs for us, there is no prophet any more, no one among us who knows for how long."** (Ps 74:9) This is the best time for us Catholics to witness to our faith, to witness to the real presence of the Eucharistic Lord with us and within us. Let us look toward a better and brighter future. Let us trust in the words of Jesus who offered hope to his apostles. (Jn 14:1-21) He didn't disappoint them. Jesus assured them of another Paraclete. (Jn 14:16,17) He sent the Holy Spirit, the paraclete, as he had promised. The apostles who stayed in the Upper Room since the arrest and death of Jesus, came out after receiving the Holy Spirit on the Pentecost Day. The Holy Spirit worked great wonders through them beyond their imagination, not only through miracles and conversions but also through the strength and courage to witness before their enemies, and finally to lay down their lives. "You will do greater than what I do" said Jesus. (Jn 14:12) The apostles couldn't believe themselves working great deeds in the name of Jesus (Acts 3:6) and by the power of the Holy Spirit working in and through them. Peter's shadow caused healings. (Acts 5:15) At this moment of uncertainty, and threat to our health and life, let us realize the presence of God the Father "with us and in us." Let us realize the presence of God the Son, Jesus Christ, "with us and in us." Let us realize the presence of God the Holy Spirit "with us and in us." Let us live our faith, courageously at this moment of the pandemic. Let us live with hope in God's promise. Let us believe that God will satisfy our hope beyond our imagination. See you soon! **Fr. SH/SVDP Grocery Ministry

Sacred Heart of Jesus Parish has partnered with St. Vincent DePaul to provide much needed grocery items to those who are experiencing hardship during this unprecedented time. If you are willing and able to participate, we welcome your support! We plan to do this for four weeks, then will continue beyond that time frame as need warrants. Here's how it will work: Each week, choose to provide as many items as you desire from each list, and drop them off at the parish office, **no later than Wednesday afternoon**, in the Brown St. vestibule, during office hours (M-F, 8:30AM-4:30PM, except May 25). We will leave the door unlocked, so you can safely deposit your items there without any contact from us. If you need help with your items, we can also pick them up from you curbside, or, if you live in Reedsville, Sue Parzanese can bring your items from your home to the office (just call the office at 717-242-2781 and let her know). If you would like to do more than one week at a time (since you grocery shop less than once a week), feel free to do so, and we will save those items for the week in which they were intended. We will then bag them up and deliver them to the St. Vincent DePaul's offices on Monument Square for distribution. If you know of someone who is in need, feel free to call the parish office (717-242-2781) or St. Vincent (717-363-4812) so we can reserve some groceries for them. **Our next distribution is planned for Thursday, May 21st.** We pray that you are all well! We thank all of you in advance for helping us to spread some charity in our community. **Update: Week #1 we were able to help 26 families.**
